This last year — in common with many other years - has not always been easy. We still struggle to find enough volunteers to help in our worship and service, and we'd love to see more people coming to find the hope, and the new life God gives us through Jesus. Of course, finance is always a real challenge, and we'd love to be able to engage with more families, children and young people.

But God is good, and we are being shown God's heart and purposes for us. We have a mantra we use a lot now at PMC:-

'You are Loved; You are Valued; You Belong'.

It's a message we want to live out and share with all. In fact, we believe it's what God wants us to make known in all our community. God really does love us all – whoever we are – and each of us is valued by God, and belong in God's family.

Jesus once shared a metaphor of a wedding banquet where all – absolutely everyone - was invited and had a seat at the table. PMC seeks to be a church that lives out that parable. We want to love all too, valuing and welcoming all people into our family. Everyone has a place at this table!

So, thank you to all of you for being part of this amazing family, as together, we seek to journey in the wild adventure of life and faith - where all are loved, valued and belong!

Finance Report

A year ago we were looking at a bleak position financially. We forecast that, without some intervention, we would be losing more than £40,000 last year and predicting that this year those losses would be doubled. This was clearly an unsustainable position.

I am pleased to say that there has been some better news since then and a series of measures including additional giving, increased income from renting our rooms and an amazing job by the property team to manage within a very tight budget, helped to reduce last year's loss. Further help came from the circuit to cover some of the costs which we include in our budget that can be seen to support work at a circuit level. Together, this meant we just about broke even financially.

It is great that many of these steps help to contribute on a regular basis to help improve income and manage our costs, but sadly we remain in a difficult financial position. There have been many new people giving regularly and also many who already give and increased their giving in the last year. We are tremendously encouraged by that and thank everyone who has considered their giving both in time and money. Unfortunately, the overall giving has suffered from the loss of other donors and our giving income overall is therefore still down on previous years. This is also worse because of, on the expenditure side, the large increases in salary in response to inflation and the extraordinary increase in energy costs

Short term we are helped this year by the generous offer, that was announced nearly a year ago, to double the increased regular giving by all donors. Together, these initiatives will help move towards balancing the books again. For those who have not yet done so, please examine your giving and, if you are able, please consider giving to church if you are not already doing so and, if you are, please consider whether you are able to increase this at all. All such increases will be included in the offer to match all new regular giving before the end of June when the initiative closes.

We should also benefit from some further support from Circuit to reflect their benefit from the office and Morgan's work across the circuit, which should improve the position slightly from that shown in these figures. Looking ahead, we need to look at grant funding to support our work and our larger projects. These would cover both larger building projects, like the one we are running to replace the boilers, together with those to support our mission projects. These will remain an important source of support to all that the church does and involve dedicated effort over many years to make this work.

Our thanks to all those who have contributed to the financial well-being of all that goes on at PMC, in so many and varied ways. Your prayers for wisdom and guidance as we navigate the road ahead are sought and welcomed.

We have an amazing Building and Campus here at PMC, representing both a wonderful blessing and a source of challenge!

Blessing. Our Property offers so much potential and opportunity for us to function well as a church in so many different ways. We have a great worship space, and other

rooms that lend themselves to alternative patterns of worship. Our Building gives many options for reaching out to our community, and we successfully let out our rooms to other users. Sarah and Lindsay do an amazing job in managing these lettings – which cover the basic running costs of our PMC property.

Challenge. This is a large, 150yr old, listed building which takes a lot of effort and money to maintain! A bit like painting the Forth road Bridge, it never ends! Rising utility costs, and an ageing heating system, all add to the challenges.

But, we have an amazing team of volunteers that form our Property team. They not only give wise counsel and wisdom in managing our property, but do so much work themselves – saving us money that would otherwise be paid to get work done. The team is 'led' by Don Agus – who works tirelessly maintaining our building, assisted by Bryan Gardner, Ian Mutch, Mike Wicker, Dave Fortey, Jim Irving, Steve Clements, Lindsay Wilson, and Tracey Cooke. My huge thanks to them.

Just a few things to highlight:

Property Steward - we still need a named Property Steward to head up our Property Team and be the 'go-to' person to manage our premises. Please pray whether God may be calling you to fulfil this role.

Quinquennial - we had a quinquennial inspection on our property completed last year, which didn't identify any areas for investment outside of those we already knew.

Windows - our contractor finished a major project repairing or replacing the windows throughout our building, and the Property Team are on track to complete consequent internal redecoration before AGM. This will prevent water ingress, and dampness, save on heat loss, and drafts, and provide many years of service.

Utility costs - continue to rise exponentially. However, we fitted smart thermostats to each room 2 years ago, and have now fitted additional insulation over Tarn, Beacon and the office rooms. This, together with isolating the heating for separate rooms, has meant we have reduced the amount of electricity and gas — saving the church many hundreds of pounds in utility costs.

A new Welcome Board - has been fitted outside the front of PMC providing a welcome and information to visitors and new folk.

Ullswater Room - has just had the floor sanded and re-varnished with sports court markings laid.

Boiler replacement - we have formed a small working group to investigate options for replacing our ageing boiler system with a greener, carbon-neutral solution. This group will consider different options, along with exploring grants and funding.

Budget - I've mentioned the work done by many to manage work on our property ourselves, and the Property Team is looking to save money on some of the actual expenses. The diligence in managing our energy costs despite the increased use of the building, has meant we have stayed within our extremely ambitious budget.

Worship life at PMC

There are so many others who make and serve coffee and tea, manage the sound, projection and live-stream, read and lead prayers, and do so much more in helping us praise and encounter God in our times together.

I thank all these people for their ministry – we are so grateful for your gifts and willingness to use them! – You do an amazing job and we bless you for it!

But we still need more people to help – especially in making coffee, and doing sound or projection. If you could help – even occasionally - please let us know!

We try and mix Sunday mornings up a bit with alternative styles of worship and learning – sometimes sitting in a circle, sometimes having discussions and congregational participation, sometimes using liturgy, and trying a variety of other things to keep things fresh.

As well as Sunday mornings, each Tuesday morning we hold a time of quiet, more traditional worship which offers a great chance for fellowship and reflection during the week.

Each month, we also hold our Encounter service – a more contemporary, spirit-led time of engaging with God – often done in café-style with discussion, coffee and cake!

In all of this, we continue to seek to offer our praise and worship to our amazing God, and to learn more about how we can serve and live as disciples of Jesus.



I say it every year, but I feel so honoured to be a part of a community who puts such a heavy emphasis on reaching out to those less fortunate than themselves.

You will read so many wonderful and encouraging reports in this booklet that highlight the work of so many amazing people who wish to share the love of God with those in our community.

I simply want to say a huge thank you to all those that have given their time and energy to play a part in PMC's outreach. Our **Junior Youth Club** has continued to meet on a Tuesday evening under the amazing coordination of Gareth, Helen and Alan.

It's been consistently attended by 25 to 30 young people aged between 7 and 11. They've enjoyed a Christmas party and easter open evening, a trip to Fusion trampoline park, sports at St Catherines field and are now looking forward to the annual trip to Walby Farm Park.

I cannot say a big enough thank you to Gareth, Helen and Alan who continue to host an amazing youth club for these young people, putting in an incredible amount of work and building relationships with families in our community.

In September we made the difficult decision to reduce the frequency of our Friday night **Senior Youth Club** from weekly to monthly.

I personally was quite worried that this would see a decrease in numbers but in fact, our numbers have grown. We now see a consistent group of around 15 young people that attend these monthly sessions and it's been a real blessing to build relationships with this group.

We recently joined with Appleby Youth Club and took 23 of our young people on a trip to Fusion's Friday Night session in Carlisle. Everyone had a great time and it's something we will definitely look into doing again.

Over the past few months, I have been speaking with various people about joining with the Gathering as a joint youth project in Penrith in order to address the issue of a lack of volunteers we both have. This unfortunately, will not be going ahead as the Trustees of Ignite, for a couple of reasons, don't want to work with us. However, all is not lost! The Network Youth Church worker, Emily Milburn, and myself are keen to build a Friday night Youth project that bridges the gap between the different denominations in Penrith and offers a safe, welcoming environment for young people. There's still a lot of work to do on this front but I'm hopeful that by September we will have a consistent youth project taking place.

Once again, a huge thank you has to go out to Paul, Mark, Kath, Tracey, Sophie, Gareth and Averil for helping out at various points throughout the year. These leaders have been wonderful with the young people, and I know their work is really appreciated by them.

Holiday Club

Our 2023 Holiday Club took place last August and was 'baking' themed. Always a huge undertaking with around 25 volunteers needed each day to make it happen, Holiday Club serves the families in our community by giving a fun filled week to the children, and free childcare for their parents/carers!

We were slightly lower on numbers this year with only 50 children attending due to the timing of the event. However, this created much more space for the leaders to form quality relationships with their teams, something that was found to be really valuable.

As always, the team of people that made this happen (of which there are too many to list) were amazing and I can't thank them enough for all that they did! I would like to give a shout out to the likes of PJ and Bea who put in an incredible amount of work behind the scenes and up front when delivering the sessions!

Holiday Club 2024 is taking place between 22nd and 25th July this year and will be titled 'Planet Protectors'. I'm excited to see what this year holds, how God wants to move through this event, and how the team will come together to deliver an amazing few days for all those involved

The new volunteers in the kitchen have allowed a new one in four week rota, which has made a huge difference.


Thirdly, we were very pleased to be recognised in September 2023 for 30 years' service to the community, by the Radio Cumbria Make a Difference Awards.

In one case the inviter came for the first couple of weeks and in the other the inviter was there for the whole course as a helper.



We work very much as a team, meeting monthly to pray and discuss the needs and celebrations of PMC church family, but we also have a specific role within the team.

Rev. Tim - oversees the pastoral work at PMC, along with numerous visits/phone calls throughout the year to the sick, housebound, grieving, etc. He facilitates home communion, meets with couples for marriage preparation and works with families to organise and deliver funerals.

Ange (*Pastoral secretary*) – arranges monthly meetings and sets a brief agenda for the meeting. Co-ordinating visits and phone calls to folks whose names have been brought to our attention (returning to those names at the next meeting to update on progress). Help with follow up visits and organises the Monthly Sunday Lunch.

Morgan – keeps us informed of the work he does with young people at UCC and members of the 'Living Room' group (where appropriate).

Lucy – looks out for young people in transition stages of their education. Sending cards of congratulations and blessings, as they go on to their next stage.

Marion – co-ordinates flower distribution and represents the Tuesday morning congregation.

David and Karen – arranges the sending of cards at a time of sadness, loss and special celebrations. They arrange and attend home communions each month.

Ruth – Keeps us informed of folk who we may not have seen so regularly in the building for a variety of reasons, but we want to show that they still belong to PMC's family. Ruth also works closely with Marion and the flower team.

An important part of the pastoral work are the 19 **Pastoral contacts**, who look out regularly for folk on their lists who are not associated with a small group.

We have 9 **Small group leaders** who keep us informed of any changes within their group, feeding back to the team of any information which may need additional support (when appropriate) *Please see small group individual reports*

Please continue to pray for all the pastoral work at PMC that is listed above, but there are many additional hours each week that are practised informally, which makes us such a caring church family. Please keep us informed, so no one is left out or feels alone.



Since then we have been watching Brian Draper's latest Friday reflection series on YouTube, pausing to add our own thoughts when he asks for contributions on chat in his virtual session. The sessions are not long or complicated but rich in food for thought.

We will soon be planning our Summer social before a Summer break and restarting again with something new (and as yet undecided!) in the Autumn.

Eden Cap Services

Overview

We have been running our CAP Eden Debt Centre for 8 ½ years now! In that time, the Centre has managed over £1.4 million worth of debt, with over £1 million of debt cleared!

There are around 20 volunteers serving as befrienders, and we have a passionate and dedicated management team and so many others praying for our work and helping in many different ways.

In addition to the Debt Centre, we run an effective CAP Job Club headed by Michelle Pierce, and have just launched a new, re-modelled CAP Money program run by Alan Sibley

CAP Debt Centre – Jen Dixon (Manager)

We have recently had a change to the team. Jon Cook left the Debt Centre in May and I have had the great privilege of stepping into the position of Debt Centre Manager. We have recruited a new Debt Coach who is currently completing their training and will be ready to start working with clients later in the summer.

The Debt Centre continues to be fully subscribed with new clients. Sadly the ongoing impact of The Cost of Living Crisis and increased household bills, means that the overall picture is tough, we regularly see unsustainable budgets. Accessing pots of funding to help with basic necessities such as food, is a regular part of the support we offer.

We are continuing to grow and build referral pathways with local agencies and have recently received referrals from a number of different places including the Job Centre, Health and Wellbeing Coaches and Addiction Services. The Debt Centre also works collaboratively with the Job Club and Money Coaching so that our clients can also receive ongoing support in budgeting and employment to help prevent debt building up in the future.

CAP Job Club – Michelle Pierce (Manager)

Our CAP Job Club is the only one currently operating in Cumbria. It continues to run on Tuesday mornings and since January 2024 we have had 13 people attend. We have found that the piloted rolling nature of the course has been very

successful, allowing participants to commence the course anytime after the official start date. This means that all sessions are modified and adjusted to suit individual needs.

In addition to the Tuesday course, a lot of support is provided by telephone and email. The requirement for CV's, references, other work related issues and assistance with many general problems is ongoing throughout the week.

Overall, we are running at a 50% success rate in finding clients suitable work. It became apparent at the recent Northern CAP Conference in Burnley that this percentage is above all but one (which has the same percentage) other CAP Job Clubs operating in the North West of England.

In addition to providing employment support, the Job Club is often the first step in clients hearing about and talking about Christianity. Every Tuesday session commences with a short bible reading and reflection, testimony or prayer.

It is a privilege to help people both in their job seeking and faith journey.

CAP Money

The Cap Money Coaching course provides help with budgeting and money management. It can be useful for anyone whose financial situation has changed, anyone who is worried about money or anyone who wants to be better at managing their finances.

Liz Johnson, Dave Johnson and Alan Sibley have just run their first course together and are now looking for opportunities to run further courses.

Finance - see ACM booklet for full report

Steve spoke on behalf of treasurers (Chris, Shane & Steve).

There have been challenging times for many years, this isn't the first and won't be the last when it comes to finances. It was noted that the building isn't what is costing the money, this is balanced by the income from conferencing. Our mission and ministry covers the majority of our expenditure – our want to provide and reach out to the community.

Last year we had a loss of £30k and this year it is looking to be closer to £40k - if we do nothing, this is likely to be £90k next year. Our 'rainy day' reserves have been used and we seriously need to look at what we do in the future.

Thanks was given to the property team for the work that they have done in previous years which has meant that some of our bills are not as high as they could have been following the increases. We have also done work ourselves, which means that we have been able to keep costs lower. £10k less spend this year by doing things ourselves.

Thanks was also given to the office & Lindsay for their work bringing groups into the building and letting the rooms out, making £40k this year (double that before Covid).

Times are tough with the cost of living increasing, however we need to look at an increase in our Direct Giving. Without it, we will need to reduce our expenditure. Without it, something will have to stop. Without it, our ministry will be reduced.

An appeal was given for someone to help apply for available grants.

Despite everything we are not discouraged. There is a lot going for us! There is a way ahead!

Tim gave thanks to the three treasurers for taking on the role and stepping up and asked everyone to reflect on their giving.

Ambition is limitless, finance isn't.
