September 1st! So... a HAPPY NEW (academic and Methodist Church) YEAR to one and all. Another year gone by so quickly? Another New Year and the future lies open in front of us.

In Turner's painting, the wind is blowing the rain across our faces making the world appear blurred. Out of the lashing rain a black dragon-like monster, breathing fire, charges towards us.

It's unstoppable. The tail of the beast snakes behind it, lost in the distance. But it's not just the rain which is making everything all of a blur. Speed softens the shapes and mutes things as well. Very quickly, in the blink of an eye, this engine will have passed us, off and away into the future.

It's 1844 and the Industrial Revolution is here. Unstoppable change. The old has gone and the new has arrived. The old forms of transport are below in the far distance – a boat on the river and a road bridge for horse-drawn carts are off to the left – left behind. Nature itself is being swept away. Zoom in really closely. Apparently, a little hare on the tracks (hardly seen) is running for its life, escaping out of the path of the steam engine.

Is this painting, then, in praise of the bright and hopeful future, or is the gloomy rain a mournful, sad and depressing farewell to the old ways? Like another of Turner's paintings, "The Fighting Temeraire", perhaps this is a nostalgic cry for what is being lost, rather than a hopeful celebration of the industrial steamdriven age that is to come. How you view this painting might depend, then, upon how you think about change and the future. Are you optimistic about our scientific and technological future? Will it be a "Brave New World" with poverty, disease and hunger eradicated? Is it true that "things can only get better"? Or are you more pessimistic? Were things better in the past? Are we heading for a dystopian future of polluted air and oceans, climate change, over-population and nuclear wastelands?

And, in this painting, where would you rather place yourself, I wonder? Would you prefer being on the footplate stoking the fire in the boiler, with the excitement and action of driving a speeding train? Or would you rather be in the tranquillity of the boat, drifting on the river below?

Or, in fact, do we place ourselves with that little hare on the tracks? Does it feel to us as if the future itself is steaming full speed, unstoppably towards us, and that we are about to be squashed in its path? In all the hectic speed of change and technological advancement do we embrace the new future, or do we scream: "Stop the world! I want to get off..."?

Constant change (whether we like it or not) is here to stay. And the pace of change seems to be ever increasing. Think of the changes that have happened in your own lifetime. It can be hard to keep up. But... in the face of all this change there is one solid foundation which will never change. It is strong and dependable. Changeless. God's love in Jesus Christ! The same, yesterday, today and forever.

Penrith Linking Lives


The befriending network Penrith Linking Lives operates across our area providing support and connection for many who live alone or who are socially isolated.

CARING FOR THE CARE STAFF and VOLUNTEERS OF CUMBRIA

Wellbeing retreats and time out days - free to Cumbrian care staff.

A collaborative project between the Sacred Space Foundation and the Diocese of Carlisle, an initiative of our former Bishop James and Rev. Prof. Stephen Wright of the Sacred Space Foundation and Honorary Fellow of the University of Cumbria.

During 2020-22 Our successful project provided peaceful rest and restorative retreats at the Diocesan Centre of Rydal Hall.

Focussing on the needs of care staff and volunteers from many different backgrounds (health, social, teaching, care home, police, ambulance....), we provided time out days and short stays at Rydal Hall for some 80 Cumbrian carers.

Thanks to the generosity of the people of Cumbria we are able to offer more quiet days this year – including a three-night residential retreat in September (23, 24,25) for 10 people, and a chance to rest and relax on a single time-out day on 14th October.

Both include time (all optional) for quietness and reflection, guided walks and teachings in meditation and relaxation – all in the beautiful and hospitable setting of Rydal Hall. Good food. Fresh air. And a chance to be taken care of for a change, rather than doing the caring.


Cost? Nothing to applicants, but we ask for a deposit which is fully refundable when you turn up.

The course teaches budgeting skills that can help you make the most of your money, and to worry less about money. The course has a proven track record having helped thousands of people.


The content is relevant to most people who want to be more in control of their finances. The material is very accessible and easy to follow.


Restore on the Road 2024–2026 and Beyond...

These will be taken to an orphanage and refugee centre in UKRAINE where they will be made into TRENCH CANDLES, which are used for light, heat and even cooking.




The soldiers also need (in good condition) socks, woolly hats and gloves. AND (NEW) toothbrushes, toothpaste and razors.
